### PIFs required beginning Feb. 15

# FOR THE RECORDS

## *Deutsches Geschlechterbuch* is an essential genealogical source

*Deutsches Geschlechterbuch* (DGB), which can be translated as “German Lineage Book,” is an important secondary source for genealogical research that should be consulted by anyone with German ancestry. Since 1889, 220 volumes have been published, each one featuring compiled genealogies of non-noble, middle class and farm families. The series includes thousands of German and Swiss-German lineages providing genealogical information for hundreds of thousands of individuals, including many that came to the U.S.

The Special Collections Department has acquired 188 volumes of the series with plans to add all volumes available. Vols. 1 – 143 have been digitized and are available as a 20-CD set (enquire at the Department’s reference desk). Many others are available in print. A list of the Department’s holdings begins on page 4.

### Publication history

F. Mahler began publication of this remarkable series in 1898 under the title *Genealogisches Handbuch bürgerlichen Familien* (*Genealogical Handbook of Non-Noble Families*). The names long associated with the series, however, are those of the genealogist Bernhard Koerner (1875–1952), who became editor of the series beginning in 1900 with Vol. 7, and publisher Hans Kretschmer, whose company, C.A. Starke Verlag, produced and sold the volumes along with many other genealogical publications. Volumes were published continuously through both World Wars and the depression until paper shortages halted production in 1943 with Vol. 119. By the end of World War II, six further volumes had been typeset and made press-ready, and more than 40 others were in production.

Although Koerner’s home in Berlin had been destroyed by allied bombing, Kretschmer’s publishing company in Görlitz, Saxony survived the war unscathed. Post-war events proved more unfortunate for him, however. On 8 May 1945 the publishing house and its printing facilities were confiscated by the Soviet army, the presses destroyed, and its inventory of bound and unbound stock burned for fuel or turned into waste paper. Also lost were manuscripts in process and valuable genealogical research materials.

After it became clear that he would be unable to reclaim his business, Kretschmer and his family fled to the West in 1948 and eventually re-established the company in its present home in Limburg an der Lahn, Hesse. Vol. 120 was finally issued in 1955 under the new title, *Deutsches Geschlechterbuch*\*. The destruction of printing facilities in 1945 meant that the first 119 volumes were unavailable until the company recently began digitizing extant copies and issuing them on CD.

### Contents and organization

Despite the two different titles, the complete series is usually referred to as *Deutsches Geschlechterbuch*. Vols. 1 – 119, published as *Genealogisches Handbuch bürgerlichen Familien*, are known as the “Old Series” (*alte Reihe*) and Vols. 120 and later as the “New Series” (*neue Reihe*). Many of the volumes were issued in sub-series based on geographical region (Baden, Westphalia, Swabia, Hesse, West Prussia, and others.), although a number are “general” (*allgemeine*) volumes tied to no specific region.

DGB volumes are in German, and those belonging to the Old Series are printed in *Fraktur*. However, the genealogies all follow a standard format that non-German speakers can easily decipher with a word list and key to the symbols and abbreviations in English.

The main body of each volume features lines of descent for specific families. These typically begin with a narrative section that can include a description of the family’s origin, meaning of the surname, illustrations of coats of arms with descriptions, and other information about the lineage. The narrative sections often include important information. Researchers who discover that a lineage applies to them should have the narrative translated if they do not know German. Lineages are traced back to the earliest written evidence of the family’s existence. Sample pages from a volume, together with English translations, are displayed beginning page 7 of this issue.

Following the narrative is a brief family tree chart outlining the generations and the various branches described in the genealogy that follows. Generations are numbered with Roman numerals. Individuals within a generation are denoted with a letter. Although the charts do not include names (only Roman numerals and letters denoting generations), they do provide a map whereby one can locate an

individual within the lineage and determine his or her relationship to other generations.

The remaining text provides basic genealogical information about individuals within the lineage. A typical entry will include data about birth, marriage, death, occupation, place of residence, and offspring. For women marrying into the line, the name of her parents and place of birth is usually included. Each generation is presented in sequence. For example, information about children is presented only after all members of the parents' generation have been listed. Photographs of individuals, families and ancestral villages are often interspersed within the text.

Genealogical information in each lineage is largely derived from church and other written records or, in the case of later generations, reported by individuals themselves. If the researcher discovers a direct connection to one of the major lineages, then he or she will find information leading back to the earliest-known ancestors of that line. While every surname listed in the index will not yield such a jackpot—many are for women who married into a line—even these can provide clues to a family's history and origins.

### Other features

Besides genealogies, each volume also includes front material, an appendix, and an index to all surnames mentioned in the volume. Front material typically includes memorial pages to those killed in battle and introductory essays on history, culture, genealogical sources, or some other genealogical topic. Researchers who know German may find the essays in the New Series to be of special interest. Volumes in the Old Series also include cumulative indexes of lineages published up to that point and lists of subscribers.

Appendixes typically include additional information about the lineages featured in the main text, including biographies of important members, *Ahnentafel* (ancestor table), and pedigree charts for females who married into a line. Corrections and additions to lineages published in previous volumes are often found in the appendix, as well. A list of contributors (i.e., those who compiled the lineages) with their addresses is located in appendixes in old-series volumes and in the tables of contents in new-series volumes.

### Indexes

Indexes relating to DGB list surnames only, although one may (rarely) find that an index to first names or place names has been provided at the end of a lineage. Names beginning with “von,” “zu,” etc. are indexed by the primary part of the name. “zum Vorwalde” would be indexed under “Vorwalde,” for example.

The following is a description of the various surname indexes available in the Special Collections Department.

#### ■ *Deutsches Geschlechterbuch: Gesamtnamenverzeichnis der Bände 1–216* [Cumulative Index to Vols. 1 – 216], CD M94 (enquire at reference desk)

CD M94 contains a cumulative index listing all surnames mentioned in DGB through Vol. 216. The CDs are easy to use and supply the volume and page number where a surname can be found. Major lineages are noted.

#### ■ *Stammfolgen-Verzeichnisse* [Index to Lineages], R 943 S783

C.A. Starke Verlag issued several cumulative indexes in print. The Special Collections Department has the print index covering DGB Vols. 1 – 185 (an index to *Genealogisches Handbuch des Adels* (Genealogical Handbook of Nobility), another C.A. Starke Verlag publication, appears in the front of the same book).

The index includes three sections pertaining to DGB covering the series through Vol. 170 and a corresponding appendix, printed on blue paper, expanding coverage through Vol. 185. The indexes list volume numbers but not the pages where surname can be found, making it necessary to consult the surname index in individual volume where a name is located. Abbreviations used in the index include:

W	Description of the coat of arms, no illustration
BW	Full color depiction of the coat of arms
TW	Black and white depiction of the coat of arms
Wsgl	Coat of arms used as a seal
Wbf	Coat of arms used as a certificate
AT	Ahnentafel / pedigree chart (found in appendixes)
<>	Denotes a complete revision (and therefore a replacement text) of a lineage published in an earlier volume

- Cumulative index to surnames included on CDs issued to that point. CD M114 includes a cumulative index to surnames in the entire CD set.

The name<sup>1,2</sup> von der Au (von der Aue) identifies someone who lives in the Aue (meadow). An Au (Aue) is land surrounded by water, a swampy, grassy area or island and is

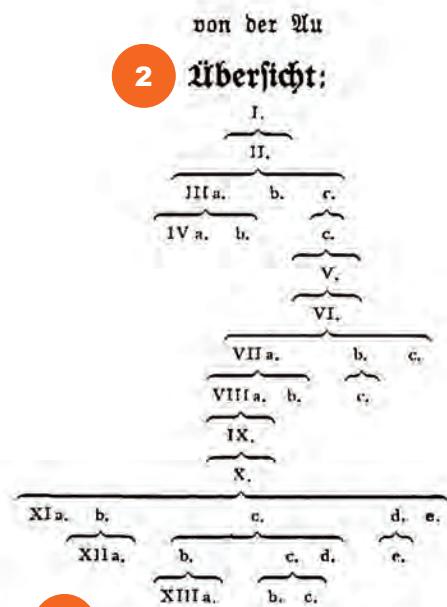
usually understood to in the same way as a *Flur* [pasture or meadow].

In Hesse<sup>3</sup> during the Middle Ages there were several family lines with the name von der Au. The current descendants go back to common ancestors in Maar near

Lauterbach, with the exception of *Johannes von der Au*, margrave forester at Siefersheim in Rhine-Hesse, born 1656, died 1708. A noble line of several generations related to one in Fulda by the same name appeared there in the 14<sup>th</sup> century and is first witnessed by records from 1338 in connection to *Hermann von der Aue*. It has been substantiated that just as a succession of free nobility from the Riedesel area—*von Keutz*,<sup>4</sup> *von Alt*, *von Dymerode*, *Winolt*, and others—made the transition to the status of Farmer [Bauer], so the bearers of the name von der Au suffered the same fate. Based on research from autumn 1927 to the present, this published lineage<sup>5</sup> covers the descendants of *Johann Heinrich von der Au*, born in 1736, and indicates the specific progenitors of other branches.

The narrative section is followed by an

(2) “overview” (*Übersicht*), shown at right, that is a graphic outline of the genealogy in the following pages. The Roman numerals represent generations. Genealogical information about individual members of the lineage follows beginning with the oldest known ancestor.

### Keep track of USB drives

A stick or USB drive is small and convenient, but it is also easy to walk away and leave it still connected to the computer. A researcher shared his method of "marking" his stick drive.

First, open a word processor – Notepad or WordPad will do – and type in your contact information. Next save the file as "I BELONG TO [YOUR NAME]," Make sure the file name is in all capital letters so it stands out. Save the file to the first level on the stick drive – not inside any folders.
